

Class Action Summary

Fresh Commercial Bread Canada

Antitrust Class Action

There is no monetary settlement at this time.***

If you or your business purchased fresh commercial bread in Canada on or after **January 1, 2001**, civil claims alleging price fixing may affect you.

Eligible Class Members: If certified, all persons or entities in Canada, who or which, at any time on or after January 1, 2001 purchased “Fresh Commercial Bread” (defined below) that was manufactured, marketed and/or sold by the “Defendants” (listed below).

Definition of “Fresh Commercial Bread”: This includes packaged bread products and bread alternatives, including but not limited to bagged bread, buns, rolls, bagels, naan bread, English muffins, wraps, pita, and tortillas. This definition is subject to change.

Defendants: The following is a list of Defendants included in at least one of the civil claims: Loblaw Companies Limited; Loblaws Inc.; George Weston Limited; Weston Foods (Canada), Incorporated; Weston Bakeries Ltd.; Weston Food Distribution Inc.; Canada Bread Company, Limited; Wal-Mart Canada Corporation; Sobeys Incorporated; Sobeys Quebec Inc.; Sobeys Capital Incorporated; Metro Incorporated; Giant Tiger Stores Limited; Maple Leaf Foods Inc.; and Empire Company Limited.

Case History: In 2017, civil claims were filed in various provinces in Canada alleging the Defendants conspired to fix, maintain, increase or control the price of Fresh Commercial Bread sold in Canada in violation of Canadian antitrust laws. The Litigation is ongoing at this time. It is impossible to predict the outcome, but money may become available to eligible class members if the classes are certified and settlements are reached with the Defendants in the future. This Summary is subject to change as the litigations progress.
